Greetings in Christ St. Luke Lutheran Church,

A while back I heard of a bold stewardship campaign run by a church called The House for All Saints and Sinners in Denver, CO. The goal for their stewardship campaign was to highlight the cooperative nature of a church's ministry. In short, they wanted their people by the end of the campaign to truly recognize that EVERYBODY who accesses a church's ministries has stewardship responsibilities over those ministries. Whether it's giving time, talents, or treasures (usually, a mixture of all three) a church's ministry works best when everyone is invested.

How did they get their point across? During their four-week capital campaign, everybody on their stewardship committee wore orange t-shirts with big black lettering saying, "This stuff aint free"... only they didn't use the word "*stuff*" (2). The House for All Saints and Sinners is an inner-city church in Denver, so culturally speaking, they could get away with more "colorful language" than most churches.

But, the bold statement of their campaign made two specific points.

First, communities raise each other in faith. Sometime on Sunday morning or Wednesday night, notice the plethora of people contributing to the formation and incubation of faith in the life of St. Luke. Sunday school volunteers are teaching Christ's story to the next generation, singers and musicians are opening our hearts to hear the Word of God in new ways, Tech team is ensuring people who can't make it into the building can still be part of our worshipping community, the Table Guild has beautified our sanctuary & set the Table for our holy meal, somebody has made treats & goodies that await us after church to provide fare for holy conversation, somebody has cleaned everything up, and the list could go on and on. With all these talents contributing in concert to our faith lives, our faith formation is well nurtured and incubated. Thanks be to God for your gifts of time and talents.

Second, offering fuels mission. Even in the early church, conversations about money were hard. Did you know that one of the poorest churches in the first century was the church in Jerusalem? Even though the Jerusalem church was the first Christian church from which all other churches were birthed and even though it was run by Jesus' own brother, James, the Jerusalem church had a hard time gathering enough resources to care for the poor, hungry, widowed, and orphaned in their midst. For that reason, the Apostle Paul asked for help from other, wealthier churches in Asia Minor. What is interesting is *how* Paul asked for help. At the end of some of his letters he adds a plea that the wealthier churches might help the church in Jerusalem (see Romans 15:23-28 as an example). In his plea he usually uses a bit of guilt (he says, "Hey, other people have helped, won't you help too?"). Paul obviously is uncomfortable asking for ministry funds: *His pleas come at the <u>end</u> of his letters, as sort of an <u>add-on</u>, and they utilize the somewhat manipulative tool of <u>quilt</u> to get his point across. Even in the first century, Paul knew that offering fuels mission. And even in the first century, Paul had a hard time inviting monetary gifts. That slogan from The House for All Saints and Sinners helped their church (in a humorous and disarming away) recognize two important stewardship truths: offering fuels mission, and fueling mission works best when it is a cooperative responsibility shared by the whole church.*

Why all this talk on stewardship? October is Stewardship Emphasis month at St. Luke. During the last three Sundays of October, through preaching, teaching, and at-home Bible studies—watch for the mailer!—we'll help the community of St. Luke intentionally reflect on how we do mission together by pooling our time, talents, and treasures and inviting God to use all those things for His good work in our community. Thank you for taking part in the conversation. Thank you for taking time to reflect on your stewardship practices. And thank you for cooperating with St. Luke's mission to be a church of hope and help in Goodhue and beyond.





Stewardship Monthly Newsletter – October 2024

Part 2: Stewardship: Time, Talents and Treasures

As you might remember, I wrote an article about stewardship for the St. Luke Church May newsletter. In that article, the main idea was about our offering as an act of Worship in our church service. We are invited to express ourselves and to give up something we value as a sacrifice to God during the offering. We are acting as stewards of the church when we provide an offering. This month, I continued to take deeper dive into stewardship.

In preparation to write this article, I continued reading a book about stewardship, read several passages from the Bible, researched the word steward, and prayed and carefully discerned as to what I should write about. It became very clear that one could continue to write many, many pages about stewardship. I will focus on the word steward as it relates to our time, our talents and our treasures.

A Bible verse that appeared many times in my preparation is from 1 Corinthians 4: 1-2: "You should think of us as Christ's servants who have been put in charge of God's secret truths. The one thing required of such a servant is that he be faithful to his master." All of us are living in this world as stewards of God even if we don't think we are. He has trust in us to care for all the things that He allows us to use. Being a faithful steward is: viewing our world as God's creation and to be grateful to be in it, understand that God cares for those who He has made, and lastly, trust God will provide us with whatever is needed to be content.

We are all the faithful stewards at St. Luke Church. The Bible reminds us from 1 Chronicles 29:14, paraphrased into a hymn, that we are just that; faithful stewards:

We give thee but thine own, Whatever the gift may be; All that we have is thine alone, A trust, O Lord from thee.

People of the church offer their time, their talents, and their treasures. The act of being a steward may be quiet and unseen, it may be in a season of the church or life that you can say "yes" to your time, talent, and/or treasure, or maybe you are involved in a group or committee that has a more regular time commitment that is more easily seen in the church. Wherever you are in your season of life at St. Luke Church or even outside of our church family, may you continue to know you are loved steward of God.

There are so many examples that come to mind when I think of the faithful stewards at St. Luke Church. The number of examples could go pages and pages! Each and every one of us can probably share many more examples of what our faithful stewards do. This list is just to name a few (not intentionally leaving anyone out), who are sharing their time, talents, and treasures with our church family:
